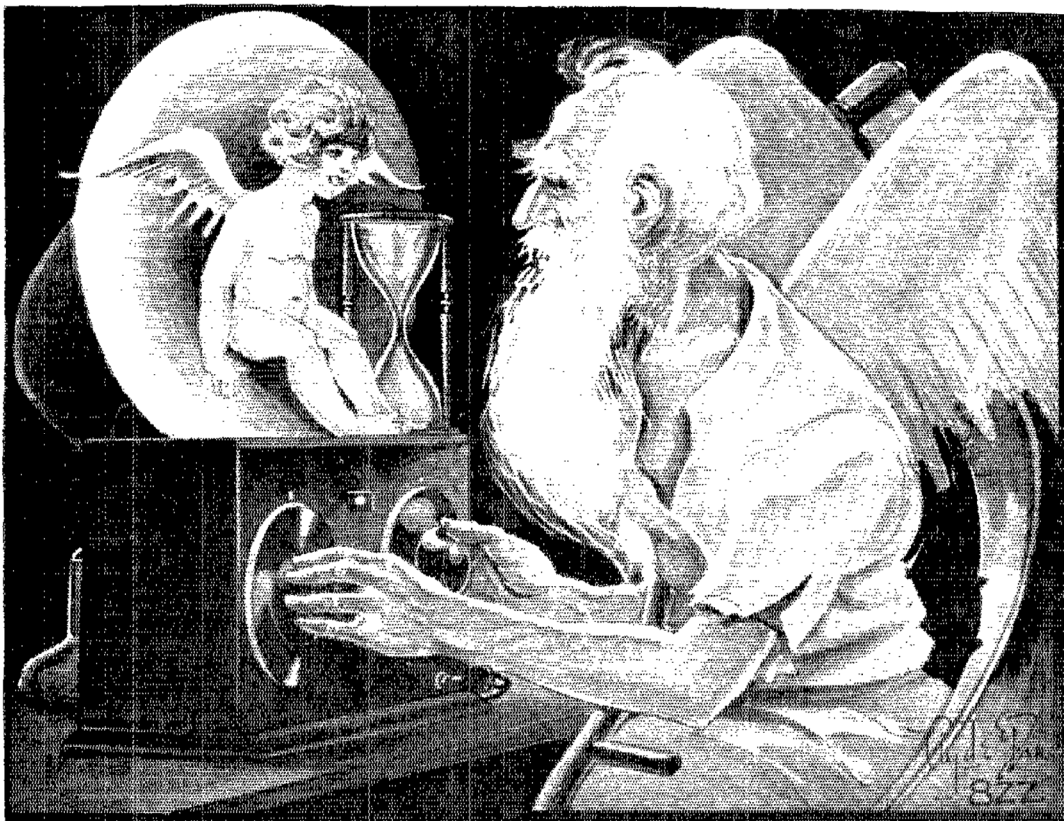

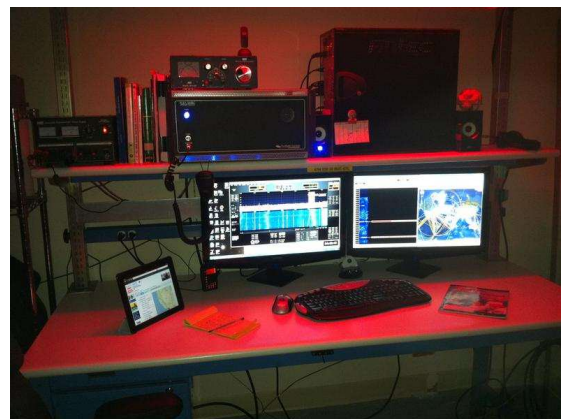

Bruce Perens K6BP of Berkeley, CA is the founder of No-Code International, an organization that advocates for the elimination of the Morse code requirement in Amateur Radio licensing worldwide, while working to influence the International Telecommunications Union, FCC, and regulators in numerous nations.

According to *QST*, August 1999, Bruce co-authored a front page article in the *Wall Street Journal* headlined: "To Ham Operators, Morse Code Test is Like a Latin Exam" which appeared in a June, 1999 edition. According to reporter Lee Gomes at the time, Bruce is quoted as saying: "Morse code is an antiquated technology". He went on to quote K6BP as saying that he is not concerned about a "post-Morse code ham world inhabited by barbarians".

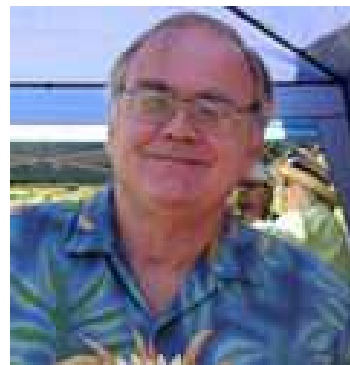

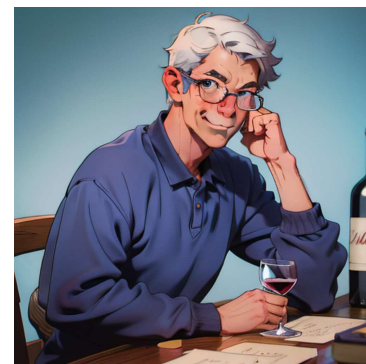

The Entity That Slipped Away:

How the Free City of Danzig Vanished from the Deleted List



As DXers, we pride ourselves on precision. Countries are counted, verified, crossed off, and—when history intervenes—carefully marked *deleted*. We like our ledgers clean and our totals unambiguous. Yet every so often, a quiet anomaly surfaces, one that resists neat accounting.

The Free City of Danzig is one of those anomalies.

It was real. It was worked. It was counted. And yet, for reasons that still feel unsettlingly human, it nearly vanished—not from history, but from memory. Specifically, ***from the very list meant to remember such things***: the DXCC Deleted Entities list.

How does a country disappear *twice*?

A City with Too Much History

Danzig was never comfortable in its own skin. Born out of the Treaty of Versailles in 1920, the Free City existed as a geopolitical compromise—neither Polish nor German, but nervously watched by both. It flew its own flag, issued its own stamps, and licensed its own ham radio operators.

To early DXers, Danzig was a curiosity and a prize. Here was a politically distinct entity with limited amateur activity, wedged between larger powers, its very existence uncertain. It *felt* like a deleted entity waiting to happen—and that made it irresistible.

Contacts were made. QSLs were exchanged. Logbooks were inked. And in September 1939, when German troops marched in and the city was absorbed into the Reich, Danzig quietly became something else: a DXCC deletion before the term even existed.

At the time, no one thought much about lists. Europe was burning.

DXCC Before Deletions Had Names

The DXCC program began in 1937 as a living document, not an archive. Countries were listed, not retired. When an entity ceased to exist, it simply stopped appearing. There was no “Deleted Entities” column—no tombstones, no footnotes.

Danzig vanished from the active list in 1939 the same way it vanished politically: abruptly, and without ceremony.

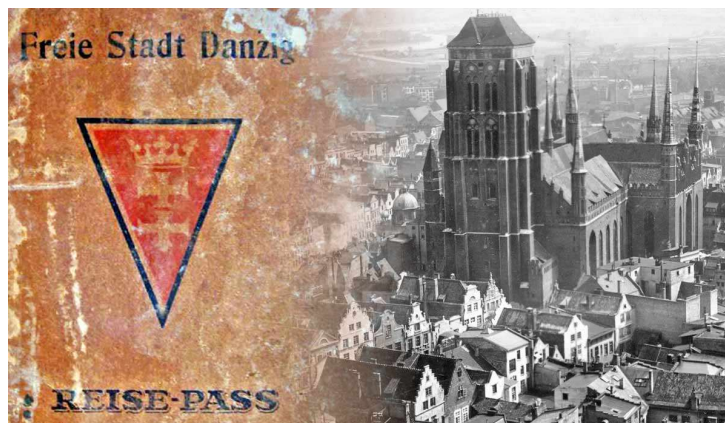
Then came Pearl Harbor. Then blackout curtains. Then silence on the bands.

The War Ends, and the Ledgers Reopen

When DXCC was rebuilt after World War II, it was done by tired people in a changed world. ARRL staff and volunteers faced an overwhelming task: reestablishing amateur radio, redefining country criteria, and untangling a geopolitical snarl that stretched from the Baltic to the South Pacific.

This was the moment when *deleted entities became a concept*.

Manchukuo. Memel. The Philippine Islands. These were entities whose disappearance occurred **during or after** the war, while the DXCC machinery was once again turning. They were processed, assigned deletion dates, and entered into the new system.

A Plausible Oversight

Here is where the story—necessarily speculative—becomes interesting.

Imagine an ARRL committee meeting in late 1946 or early 1947. Cigarette smoke curls toward the ceiling. Stacks of QSLs, many remembers from stations now silent forever, sit in battered folders. Someone is compiling the first postwar "Deleted Countries" list.

"Anything else from before the war?" someone asks.

A pause.

The Free City of Danzig is mentioned. Or maybe it isn't.

Perhaps it's dismissed as "Germany now." Perhaps someone assumes it was never formally recognized.

Perhaps the card file that once held Danzig's entry was

misfiled under "G," or lost when offices moved, or destroyed during a wartime paper drive.

Or perhaps—and this is the most unsettling possibility—**someone chose not to reopen it**.

The Result: A Clean Slate with Rough Edges

Postwar DXCC needed clarity. The world was tired of the war. Newcomers needed rules. Veterans needed continuity. What no one wanted was ambiguity—especially ambiguity tied to pre-war Europe, where borders had failed catastrophically.

So a baseline was established.

1945 became Year Zero.

Entities deleted *after* that date were formally tracked. Those that disappeared before it were quietly absorbed into history, acknowledged in old bulletins and QST articles, but not consistently carried forward.

No conspiracy. No malice.

Just exhaustion—and a desire to move on.

Danzig became a ghost entity: real, documented, but considered “out of scope.”

Why the Ghost Occasionally Reappears

And yet—like all good ghosts—Danzig refused to stay buried.

It appeared in old QST DXCC notes. YM4AA, YM4AD and others had been reported in “Calls Heard”. It surfaced in correspondence between early DXers. And decades later, when the ARRL undertook the monumental task of creating the **Diamond DXCC Challenge list**, someone had to ask the uncomfortable question:

What about everything that came before?

That was the moment Danzig re-emerged—not onto the active list, and not quite onto the formal deleted list either, but into a liminal space. Acknowledged. Footnoted. Present—but not fully restored.

Enough to prove it existed.

Not enough to explain why it vanished.

A Motive, If One Must Be Found

If there was a motive—and again, this is conjecture—it may have been institutional self-preservation.

Recognizing every pre-war entity would have forced ARRL to reopen old claims, validate fragile QSLs, and confront the uncomfortable reality that DXCC’s earliest records were incomplete by modern standards.

Better, perhaps, to let some things remain implicit.

Better to remember selectively. Maybe better to forget.

a city between worlds, an entity between lists, and a reminder that even in DXing—where we count everything—some things are lost not to malice, but to time.

Why This Matters to Us

To the new DXer, this may sound like ancient history. To the Honor Roll DXer, it may feel like nitpicking.

But Danzig matters because it reminds us that DXCC is not just a list—it is a *human artifact*. It was built by operators who lived through uncertainty, war, and loss. It carries their assumptions, their shortcuts, and their silences.

Some entities were deleted.

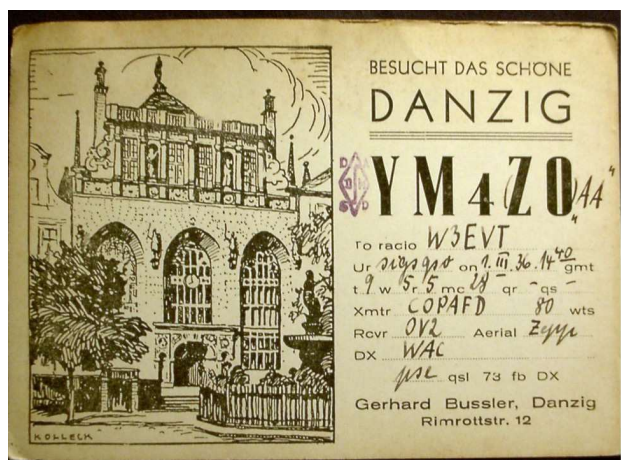
Some were forgotten.

And a few—like Danzig—simply didn't make the cut.

The Final Mystery

This actually happened. Here are a few rare examples of pre-war QSL cards bearing a Danzig address. They are not just collectibles, they are witnesses.

Today, the Free City of Danzig remains what it has always been: a city between worlds, an entity between lists, and a reminder that even in DXing—where we count everything—some things are lost not to malice, not to indifference, but to time.

CW – A Point/Counterpoint Opinion by an Old Timer

"Point/Counterpoint" was a hallmark of 1970s **60 Minutes**—a liberal and a conservative journalist squaring off on the issues of the day. Hearing both sides wasn't just provocative; it was genuinely informative. Classic television at its best.

This month's SDDXC program features Bruce Perens, K6BP, of Berkeley, CA. As founder of No-Code International, Bruce has long advocated eliminating the Morse code requirement for amateur radio licensing. He famously likened Morse code to Latin: an antiquated technology, irrelevant to modern hams. In his view, the CW portions of our bands are relics best left to "barbarians."

Well, I confess: I'm one of those barbarians.

But I'm a barbarian who has lived comfortably in two worlds—the digital revolution and the golden age of ham radio DXing.

In 1968–69, as a young IBM systems engineer, I helped pioneer high-speed data communications alongside AT&T. From that era's clunky 2701 TCUs to today's gigabit fiber, technology has leaped forward in ways I once only dreamed of. I built my career (and my fortune through startups) on digital innovation, with zero regrets. Yet ever since the day I lugged my Vibroplex bug onto a Chicago bus and headed downtown to pass the 20 WPM code test at the FCC office in the Federal Building, my passion for CW and DXing has never faded.

Think of it this way: I love the wind-in-my-hair thrill of driving my vintage MG TD on a sunny afternoon. But when I need to get to a meeting on time, I climb into my modern, digitally loaded daily driver. Is it really so strange to cherish both?

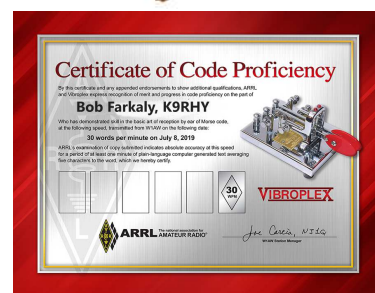
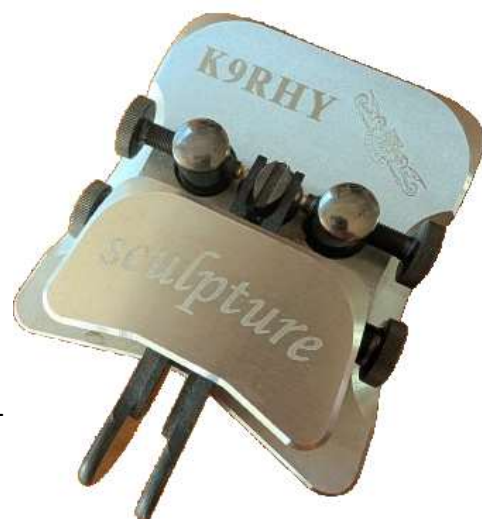
Now comfortably retired, my bucket list is short. Just one ham item left: I'm one shy of the #1 Spot at the Top of the ARRL CW DXCC Honor Roll, waiting for Kim Jong Un to flip the switch and reopen ham radio in North Korea so I can finally work that elusive P5 on CW. My current CW position is 339/351, so just P5 to finally have them all.

To borrow an old cliché, CW may not be everyone's cup of tea. But to this barbarian DXer, it's the perfect brew. At SK time, they'll have to pry my Begali keyer from my cold, dead hands.

(And yes, I'll keep answering CQs in the old bands—because some things are worth preserving.)

BV9P Update: China's PLA Sends Drone Into Airspace Near Pratas Island

The [People's Liberation Army](#) said it sent a drone into airspace near the Taiwan-controlled Pratas Island on Saturday, as Beijing [ramps up military pressure](#) amid soaring cross-strait tensions.

The deployment was “a routine flight training in the air-space around China’s Dongsha Island, which was completely legitimate and lawful”, the PLA Southern Theatre Command, which oversees the South China Sea, said in a statement just a few days ago.

It came hours after the Taiwanese defense ministry reported that a PLA surveillance drone had entered the airspace of Pratas, also known as Dongsha in mainland China and Tungsha in Taiwan, at 5.44am and remained in the area for four minutes.

Pratas is the largest natural island in the South China Sea and commands a vital strategic position in its northern reaches, bridging the Taiwan Strait and the Bashi Channel.

It lies 450km (280 miles) southwest of Kaohsiung in southern Taiwan and 260km from Shantou, in the southern mainland province of Guangdong.

It had described the two-day “[Justice Mission 2025](#)” exercise at the end of December as a stern warning against “Taiwan independence” separatist forces and external interference.

Beijing views Taiwan as part of China, to be reunited by force if necessary. Most countries, including the United States, do not recognize the self-governed island as an independent state, but Washington is opposed to any attempt to take Taiwan by force and is legally bound to provide weapons for its defense.

Beijing has repeatedly described Taiwan as the “very core of its core interests”, and it has been the most sensitive issue in its relations with the US.

Beijing has also steadfastly condemned Washington’s arms sales to the island, including a [record US\\$11 billion weapons package](#) announced in mid-December, which cast fresh doubts on US President Donald Trump’s planned visit to China this April.

Desecheo Credit: DXCC says YES, IOTA says NO

Another Chapter in DX Award-Program One-Upmanship



This headline tries to get my point across with a knowing wink to experienced DXers — that it's the same old silly-but-serious rivalry between the two systems — without crossing into crude (but obvious) territory about such differences of opinion.

The ARRL is expected to accept contacts with the current Desecheo operation (using stations operated remotely from the nearby yacht while IOTA rules call it a remote operation that does not qualify for award credit.

This type of disagreement is not without precedent. Here are a few random examples of similar disagreement between the ARRL and the IOTA committee:

- **Recognition of contacts without physical QSL cards** was a bone of contention for years until the IOTA bigwigs accepted the fact that eQSL, LOTW and verified contest contacts were, indeed, valid for award qualification.
- **Saint Martin Island (IOTA NA-105)**: The IOTA committee treats this as a single island group, while ARRL DXCC recognizes it as two separate entities: Saint Martin (FS) and Sint Maarten (PJ7).
- **Cyprus Island (IOTA AS-004)**: The IOTA committee accepts this as one group, whereas ARRL DXCC divides it into two entities: Cyprus (5B) and UK Sovereign Base Areas on Cyprus (ZC4).
- **Guangdong Province Coast Group (IOTA AS-075)**: IOTA considers this a unified group, but ARRL DXCC separates it into China (B) and Macao (XX9).
- **Hong Kong Group (IOTA AS-006)**: IOTA accepts it as a single group, while ARRL DXCC distinguishes between China (B) and Hong Kong (VR2).
- **Borneo Island (IOTA OC-088)**: The IOTA committee recognizes this as one group, in contrast to ARRL DXCC, which splits it into three entities: East Malaysia (9M6/8), Brunei (V8), and Indonesia (YB0-3 for Kalimantan).

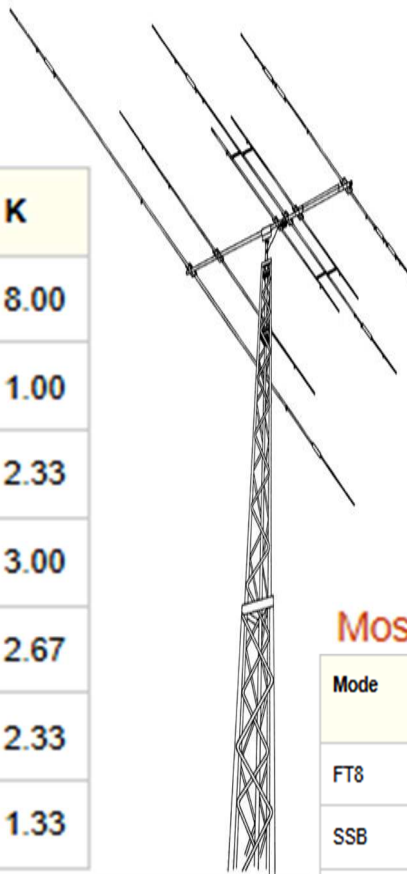

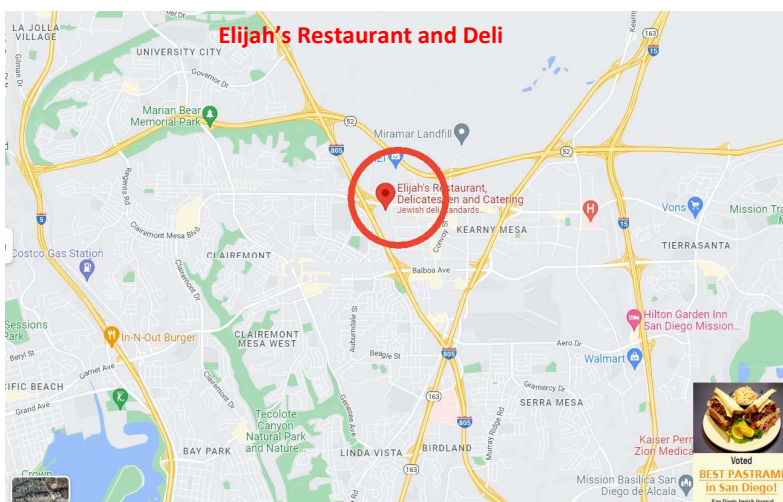
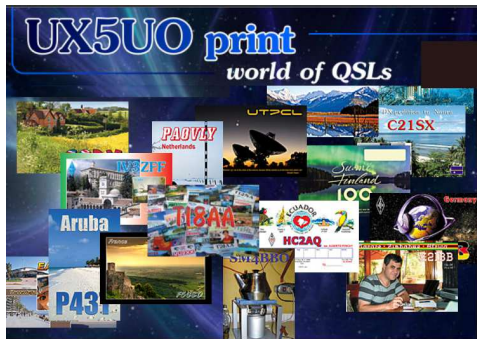
